

We Need One Another

Solomon was not only right, he was relevant when he wrote, "Two are better than one..." Perhaps a loose paraphrase would be, "We need one another."

Solomon states that "Two are better than one," and for no less than four reasons in Ecclesiastes 4:9-12.

First, they have a good return for their labor (v.9)...mutual effort.

Second, one will lift up his companion (v. 10)...mutual support.

Third, they keep each other warm (v.11)...mutual comfort and encouragement.

Fourth, they are better able to resist an attack (v. 12)...mutual strength.

Take a good look at that list. Pretty convincing evidence, I think you will agree. In our isolated, lonely world, you and I don't know many folks who wouldn't benefit from relational investments that yield such satisfying dividends.

It was the realization of all this that first prompted me to think of this when I attended the 36th Clergy-Laity Congress in Los Angeles, June 30th to July 5th. During the plane ride to Los Angeles, I remembered the comments made to me by some concerned parishioners regarding the status of the Charter. I knew that subject was uppermost in the minds of most in attendance and, for some, a thorny issue.

On Monday, the theme of the Congress, "Offering Our Faith to Contemporary America" was the focus of Archbishop Demetrios' keynote address. . In applying the theme to the work and ministry of the Archdiocese at all levels, His Eminence stated,



Farewell to a Beloved Priest!

The Greeks had two words for designating time. One was chronos clock time, the time measured by hours and days. The other was kairos, unique moments in time when something significant happens. Most of us judge our lives in terms of chronos, the moments defined by clocks and calendars. We seldom take time to find time. But, each of us can remember kairos, the moments when something special happened to us.

The special moment for us at Holy Apostles was Father Peter's ordination to the holy priesthood in August of 1997 and his subsequent assignment to Holy Apostles. We knew then, that we were receiving a devoted priest to assist with the ministries of Holy Apostles. The Diocese informed us the assignment was for two years. Fortunately, our Diocese was not aware of the chronos and the proposed two years ultimately became five years of service.

Now, because of the incredible shortage of priests, the Metropolitan informed us that Father Peter was being called by the Church to serve as pastor of the Saint Athanasios Church in Aurora, beginning on the first of September. Father Peter's last Sunday at Holy Apostles will be August 11th. There will be a farewell reception following the Liturgy on August 11th.




Father Peter, during a TOTS class. The TOTS program was started by Father Peter to begin getting young children involved in, and learning about the Church.

Meditation

✦ Fr. Peter spoke of listening to the words of Fr. Bill on Holy Saturday morning and being reminded of Christ's struggle in descending into Hades during the first Anastasi.

Pastoral Advice

✦ Fr. Peter gave a brief overview of the history of the Orthodox Church including the Ecumenical Council and the Canons of the Church. Father Peter stated that at a recent Clergy meeting, he was confronted with an advertisement that incorrectly stated that Holy Apostles formally objected to the proposed Charter. The offending parties were notified and a retraction was demanded. Father Peter said that all of us must be judicious in the way we express ourselves regarding issues facing the Church so as not to be either misquoted or misinterpreted. He relayed the position of Metropolitan Iakovos regarding the proposed Charter in which he indicated that it should be accepted and endorsed. Father Peter encouraged us to

remain faithful in our commitment to God, and our Church, and to be mindful to not use lay definitions when dealing with hierarchal matters.

Stewardship

✦ As of April 30th, the church has received 780 pledges totaling \$500,507 for an average pledge of \$641.68.

Building and Grounds

✦ Jim Fotopoulos reported that the alarm needs to be inspected by the fire department in order to finalize the project. The balance due Heat Engineering is \$10,000. We also owe the alarm installers \$2,000. To date, the special appeal has raised approximately \$101,000. We are finalizing our cost before contacting Com Ed concerning the power outage.

Ways and Means

✦ Don Alexander reported that the dance committee is looking to have a family dinner dance sometime in January, 2003. He also indicated that we are still looking for golf outing sponsors and golfers.

Old Business

✦ The church picnic is set for July 21st at Katherine Legge Park. Council members are expected to help with cooking. George Alex and Nick Kirkeles will supervise the games for the kids.

A report from the the Clergy-Laity Congress in Los Angeles

Attending the Clergy-Laity Conference from Holy Apostles were Father Bill Chiganos, Jim Banakis and representing Philoptohos were Tessie Andreakis, Chrisy Banakis and Niki Conforti. Diocese and National Philoptohos representatives were Mary Ann Bissias and Susan Regos.

The conference convened on Monday, July 1st, with a Divine Liturgy in Spanish, including the sermon and hymns. Following the Liturgy, His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios gave his keynote address. His message addressed the state of the Orthodox Church in America over the last two years. Some of the highlights of his remarks include:

- ✦ There have been many new churches and building projects throughout the country.
- ✦ Three new Bishops have been installed; 24 priests have been ordained and 18 deacons have been installed.
- ✦ The sizable debt of two years ago (\$5 million) has been reduced to just over \$1 million and should be eliminated entirely by the end of the year.
- ✦ A recap of the events of September 11 included: An update of blood donation levels, as well as financial donations; there were at least 25 Orthodox faithful killed in the attacks; The St. Nicholas Rebuilding Fund has generated \$1.3 million.
- ✦ Holy Cross Seminary doubled the number of first year students last year; however,

there is still a severe shortage of priests throughout the nation.

The delegates spent close to fourteen hours debating the proposed new charter. General Counsel, Eleni Huszagh, did an excellent job of explaining each article. She reminded us that this is only a proposed charter that has been worked on by many people over the last six years. She advised us that we had the right to amend this charter proposal, which would be sent to the Patriarch for review before the document is finalized. She also pointed out the cultural differences between Americans and the Ecumenical Patriarchate. Everyone who wished to voice an opinion concerning any aspect of the charter was heard. One of the issues of concern was whether the Patriarchate could confiscate church property in the United States. It was explained that there was already a Supreme Court ruling preventing foreign interest assuming American property, and that each of our churches are in fact, separate corporations. We were told not to confuse the charter with our Uniform Parish Regulations, which is a separate document. A lot of time was spent debating semantics.

Ultimately, there were four main amendments proposed and adopted. These amendments concerned the election of the Archbishop and Metropolitans, their power and duties. After completing these amendments, the delegates felt positive about the proposed charter.

The final plenary session concerned the budget. In a report from the finance commit-

tee, it was noted that the overall budget of the Archdiocese is \$11 million. This represents a bare bones amount in order to operate effectively. The \$11 million represents about \$15.00 per steward nationally, and was ridiculously lower than any other major religious group in America.

His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew in a message to the delegates and participants of the Congress remarked: "We are certain the Holy Archdiocese of America, which is most beloved to us, will offer Saints from her bosom and that it has undertaken in God's Providence the duty to evangelize our fellow human beings in America. It has already made much progress in the cycle of its growth, organizationally, liturgically, staff-wise and educationally; and the signs of its autonomous growth are hopeful..The Ecumenical Patriarchate does not have either the possibility or the intention to interfere in the self-governing of the Holy Archdiocese of America and of the Parishes and Communities or Institutions that are under it. Neither does it have the intention to restrict the autonomy of the above that has existed for some time."

A copy of the final draft of the charter, along with the amendments as will be on file in our church office for anyone interested in reviewing it. Also on file, will be the Archbishop's address: Patriarch Bartholomew's Message to the Congress: and all the Committee Reports.



Recommendations made to Patriarch, but "autonomous" not in Charter

"Who knows if God has not sent us to this blessed Country at this time at this hour, precisely in order to offer a model of universal Orthodoxy, a model destined to carry the authentic and whole life-giving voice of Christ to every person in every place, but primarily here in contemporary America."

The message of His All Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew was read by the Patriarchal representative to the Congress. In his message, His Holiness stated that neither he nor the members of the Holy Synod intended at any time to interfere with the administrative affairs of the church in America. This statement was to be the springboard for discussions at the first plenary session, Tuesday, July 2nd. The proposed Charter was presented article by article, with explanations offered on key issues. The chairperson was correct in pointing to the title of this document that has for several months been the focus of several articles and numerous discussions on the subject. The title reads "Joint Draft of the Proposed Charter of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America." To many, including yours truly, this was a new revelation. Most were of the opinion that the document submitted by the Patriarchate was the final text. This misunderstanding and confusion was quickly dispelled.

Delegates had the opportunity to express their concerns, ask questions or make recommendations for consideration.

Eleni Huszagh was the convener and moderator and, in my opinion, a wise appointment, who conducted an open and democratic session. She was knowledgeable about the Charter and offered concrete and succinct answers to questions raised by the delegates. Following more than 10 hours of discussion and deliberations, the Congress approved a request that asks the Ecumenical Patriarchate to grant the proposed Charter "with such modifications as will reflect the major con-

cerns expressed by the Archdiocesan Council, the Parishes, and the Clergy-Laity Congress." Archbishop Demetrios did announce to the delegates that the Charter should not be viewed as a ping pong game, i.e. going back and forth from Constantinople to America. After the amendments and resolutions are forwarded to the Patriarchate for review, we will be informed of the final text. Although the word 'autonomous' does not appear in the text, requests were made to His Holiness that the Eparchial Synod of America have a voice in the election of the Archbishop and Metropolitan. Also, recommendations were made that the Congress convene at least once every three years.

The Congress offered participants a selection of some 50 different sessions and workshops focusing on guidance and resources for Offering Our Orthodox Faith in Contemporary America. This was clearly a sign of growth and maturity for the Church in America. In addition, record participation was visible in the Divine Liturgy services held each morning. The inclusion of Spanish, English and Greek Liturgies was one more step toward the understanding that we are part of the "One Holy Catholic Church."

Of course, there were disagreements and differences of opinions during the plenary sessions, but that is part of the democratic process. I left the Congress with a positive feeling and the hope that in the future wise decisions will be made for the improvement and advancement of our Orthodox Church in America.

I know that our Church is no longer to be considered a Church of the Diaspora, but one capable of making a viable contribution to contemporary America. I also better understand Solomon's words that "We Need One Another." May harmony and peace prevail in our hearts and in the churches throughout America.


bronze and a gold medal. No words can describe the feelings shared by all of camaraderie and the true Olympic spirit!
