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

Hidden With Christ

Hidden is an intriguing word. It conjures up fascinating images and thoughts like hidden treasure, hidden secret, hidden bank account, hidden compartment, hidden weapon, hidden passageway, hidden camera, hidden assets, hidden past, and so forth. That adjective, hidden, usually piques our interest and curiosity.

From all of the above, the word mystery leaps out at me. When we fail to disclose an answer or solution it is because it is hidden from view. In a graduate course at the Lutheran School of Theology, a New Testament professor whom I deeply respected and admired, customarily challenged his students with these concluding remarks: "In order for you to discover the meaning of a biblical verse, you must take a spade in hand and dig until you are convinced you have connected with the hidden power. This is a mystery and I use the term because we have no knowledge of the answer. Thus, many questions were raised in the story of Easter because Easter began on a hidden note."

The body of Jesus had been hidden away in a sepulcher, a cave-like burial place with a boulder, to conceal it. When some of his followers came to the tomb that first Easter morning, they found the body no longer hidden in its grave and they supposed it was hidden somewhere else. Mary Magdalene said, "they have taken away my Lord, and I do not where they have laid him" (or hidden him).

Saint Paul picks up on the word hidden when he tells the Colossian Christians that they are hidden with Christ: "For you have died, and your life is hid with Christ in God" (Col. 3:3). Paul's parallel, according to the bib-

On Clean Monday, February 15, eighteen of our Jr. Goyans got together to make no-sew, tie fleece blankets for a homeless shelter catering to teen mothers. During the two-hour gathering, 22 soft, colorful blankets with patterns, such as Spider Man, Curious George, flowers, and butterflies, were made. Making these blankets on

the first day of Lent was a wonderful way for our Jr. Goyans to start the Lenten season and begin their journey to Pascha. They experienced firsthand the joy of giving and supporting an important cause as these blankets will provide a basic necessity to families in need, especially during the cold, winter season.

The blankets, which are large enough to fit a twin-sized bed, were donated to New Moms, Inc. in Chicago. Founded in 1983, New Moms is a grass-roots agency that has served over one thousand teenage mothers and their children in Northwest Chicago. lical scholar William Barclay, states the allusion that a believer is wholly identified with Christ or hidden with Christ in both death and resurrection. Consider for a moment the act of love and unity expressed in the Liturgy. The celebrant calls out, "Let us love one another, that we may with one mind confess." We take the hand of the one seated next to us and state "Christ is in our midst," which is a

confession of faith. In these words, we are bound together through the hidden presence of Christ and this moment of joy is repeated at every Liturgy. An important aspect of Easter is that the God who was hidden through the ages known as B.C. has given the world a share in the hidden life in Christ "in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowl-

Rolling Away The Stone

Springtime brings new beginnings. If we look outside, we see new life. Flowers are blooming, grass is starting to grow, trees are getting buds on them, birds are chirping, and animals are outside playing. In the same way, the Resurrection of Christ is a new beginning for us. We have struggled through Great Lent and now find ourselves in the midst of Holy Week. In just a few short days, we will experience the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Maybe some of us have difficulty experiencing the joy of Christ's Resurrection. What keeps us from enjoying this new life that Christ offers in His Resurrection? Christ's own disciples faced the same barriers that we may face when trying to experience resurrected lives. First, there is grief. Mary Magdalene stood outside Jesus' tomb and wept. She was so overcome by grief that she could not see Jesus.

Fear is another barrier. The instant Jesus was captured, His disciples fled in fear! The same disciples that pledged their love and support the previous night left their friend because they were afraid. Another barrier is doubt. The disciples were hurt and upset when Jesus was taken away and treated like a criminal.

Sometimes it is hard to make our faith fit with the painful realities of life. Despite our circumstances in life, we should remember the words that we find in St. Paul's letter to the Romans: Christ was raised from the dead that "we should walk in newness of life." Rom. 6:4

Over three thousand years ago Job asked, "If a man die, shall he live again?" People are still asking that question today! The Lord answers: "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live. And whoever lives and believes in Me shall never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26) Justin Popovic, in his book Man and God-Man, writes, "men sought to make God mortal, but God made men immortal through His Resurrection."

The Lord's Resurrection is our reconciliation with God. It is the total defeat of the devil. Our Lord's Resurrection provides the definite destruction of death. His death and Resurrection delivers us from the power, influence and control the devil has over us.

Our Lord's Resurrection gives us the

Highlights of February and March Parish Council Meetings

Financial Report

★ The statements for Feb. and March were approved subject to year-end audit.

Stewardship

◆ 499 pledges were received in January and February. The average pledge was \$988. The amount paid as of February 28, was \$487,519. (down \$14,870 from the same period last year)

Meditation

★ Father Bill distributed a question and answer sheet regarding our knowledge of the Lenten and Easter period. He focused on the spirit of Holy Week and that we should be sure to maintain a safe and healthy atmosphere.

Building & Grounds

- + President Poteres and Steve Savas reported that Root Candles felt that we were not satisfied with the quality of their candles and did not want to lose us as a customer.
- + Therefore, they decided to donate and purchase not only the two new candle stands the Parish approved but purchased a third candle stand for us.
- **+** Two leaking urinals in the men's room will be replaced as soon as possible.
- ★ Two cracks in aisle three will be repaired after Easter.

Technical Committee

- → Paul Kallis reported that the Sound System is working and we are starting to use it. Paul trained a Goyan on its use. The remote pad for the system is in but it still has to be mounted in the cabinet. We still have an issue with the camera inside the church and will be looking to get that corrected.
- There are still some issues that he is working on.
- ♣ Paul has been working with the Archdiocese for use of one of their mail servers, in order to upgrade our email service. Once the system is viable, we will invite parishioners who have given us their email addresses an opportunity to receive information and the Mosaic online. A one-time \$500 fee was approved to set us and use the Archdiocese internet server.

power to live above the pressure and dominance of evil. St. Gregory of Nyssa writes Christ "resurrected in Himself the whole man and provided us the possibility of our own Resurrection from the dead." Because Christ took upon Himself our human nature and united it to His person, we are literally united with Him, His death, and His Resurrection.

We sing during the Paschal season: "Corruption has been abolished; incorruption has blossomed; the ancient bonds have been broken; heaven, earth and earthly beings rejoice; Christ is risen; death has been robbed and defeated."

We read from St. Paul's letter to the Romans at every baptism: "We have been united together in the likeness of His death, certainly we also shall be in the likeness of His Resurrection, knowing that our old man was crucified with Him, that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves of sin." (Romans 6:5-6) Death has now lost its power and authority. The Lord's death and Resurrection rescues us from our own fallen condition. We now have the opportunity to live a life closely connected with Christ – a resurrected life!

Visual reminders of this great opportunity can be observed in the church. For 40 days, the Royal Doors located in the middle of the icon screen will be open. This shows a relationship with Christ and the heavens are open for all of us! The power of God that raised Christ from the dead is the same power God wants to work in you and me! We can live united to that same power of the resurrected Christ!


The myrrhbearing women went to the Christ's tomb early in the morning. They arrived and saw that the large stone in front of the door was rolled away. If you are struggling, will you allow the Lord to roll away the stones keeping you from His joy? Will you allow grief, fear or doubt to steal your joy in the Risen Lord? Or, will you see the Resurrection as a new beginning? Our Lord's Resurrection should create a new mood for living and hope in all of us.

We see countless men and women's lives, experiencing our risen Lord's grace, living triumphantly over sins that previously bound them. We now have the possibility to be dead to sin and alive to God.

This Anastasi, we can know that regardless of our struggles in life, we do have the hope of eternal life with the Lord. When we realize the Lord's and our victory over death, then we will joyously proclaim, "Christ is Risen from the dead, trampling down death and bestowing life to those in the tombs."

edge" (Col 2:3).

God was hidden in Christ; hidden in a grave because of a sacrificial death necessary to display divine love, divine peace, divine forgiveness, divine obedience, and divine humility. This wisdom was embodied in the Christ hidden in the tomb and was made available for God's people to find new life through the "hiding" of their lives in His.

A Hasidic story tells of a little boy playing hide-and-seek with his friends. For some unknown reason they stopped playing while he was hiding. He began to cry. His old grandfather came out of the house to see what was troubling him and to comfort him. After learning what had happened, the grandfather said, "Do not weep, my child, because your friends did not come to find you. Perhaps you can learn a lesson from this disappointment. All of life is like a game between God and us. Only it is God who is weeping, for we are not playing the game fairly. God is waiting to be found, but many have gone in search of other things."

Chrysostom, the early church father, said that the animals which came out of Noah's Ark came out the same way they went in. There were no changes! However, those who enter in Jesus Christ, the great Ark of Salvation, go in one thing and come out something else and are totally transformed.

The Word of Christ hidden in your heart and mind is revealed to others by the way you live. To make this change in life means that you are dominated by and saturated with Christ's love. For the Christian believer, God is found when one's life is hid with Christ in God.

In conclusion, I direct your thoughts once more to chapter three of St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians explained by William Barclay: "In baptism the Christian dies and rises again. As the waters close over him, it is as if he was buried in death; as he emerges from the waters, it is like being resurrected to a new life. Now, if that is so, the Christian must rise from baptism a different man." Wherein is the difference? From now on the Christian will view everything against the background of eternity and no longer live as if this world was all that mattered. Thus we are living the Risen Life. May it be so for all of us.

Christ is risen! Truly He is risen!

In the Heart of the Desert

(Revised)

The first Christian monks lived nearly two thousand years ago, but the account of their lives and the records of their words can still be read today. They were originally written in Greek and Coptic but were soon translated into Latin so they could be read widely in all parts of Christendom.

These words of the Fathers and Mothers, sometimes inspiring and uplifting, sometimes agonizingly painful, sometimes humorous and sometimes full of sorrow, always speak straight from the soul. These stories have resonated through the centuries because they told the story of the soul in its pilgrimage from darkness to light.

With great clarity, Fr. John lets them speak to us about all those fundamentals we regularly avoid: silence, death, loneliness, grace and God. His wide learning, already evident in his earlier books, is deployed to ease our path into the desert and into what the desert uncovers in us and to us.
