

Achieve your goals for 2011

In the drama of the birth of Jesus, the Gospel writer Luke parades several people across the stage of events in what is called a cameo appearance in the theatre. The players include a man named Simeon, an aged prophet, and Anna, an 84-year old prophetess. They were found in a temple in Jerusalem everyday looking for the messianic stage. They didn't want to die until they had seen the Messiah or what Simeon called the consolation of Israel. The Holy Spirit inspired them to hang on. Their endurance paid off. In time, they were witnesses when Jesus' parents brought their forty-day-old child to the temple for dedication. It was somehow clear to old Simeon and Anna that the child was the one they had been waiting for and in Jesus, their hopes were fulfilled. Though at times the couple became weary, they pursued their goal and never gave up hope.

Taking the child in his arms, Simeon pronounced a prophetic hymn, which revealed his inner strength and faith. The main point is that salvation had come and that this salvation was for all people. Not only would there be "glory to Israel," but also there would be "a light for revelation to the Gentiles." Since he had finally seen this salvation, Simeon could depart, meaning that he was prepared to die.

Anna was the second player in the Temple scene. Her great age was emphasized: "Till she was eighty-four." Like Simeon, she was continually in the temple praying and fasting, and because of that persistence, she was present "at the very hour" when Jesus was dedicated. She also gave thanks to God and indicated that the hope of redemption was fulfilled in the child.

That was it for Simeon and Anna. How long they lived after that day, we don't know

as they are not mentioned again. In their brief cameo appearances, we admire and draw from their remarkable perseverance, patience and hope in hanging on until the fulfillment of their vision. It's a good lesson for us on the last days of December and the early days of January: the value of persevering in our hopes and dreams until they are realized.

Think back twelve months to the beginning of the year. What goals did you set? What plans did you make? What hopes did you entertain for the new year? How many of your goals were realized in 2010?

Recall, if you will, the frequency of the TV blurb stating One Goal, which alludes to the Chicago Blackhawks' repeat as Stanley Cup champions. Whatever was accomplished came about because of the perseverance and commitment of the team members, coaches, owners and everyone in the Blackhawk organiza-

tion. Nothing is ever accomplished without the resolve to see it through, to hold on until it comes to pass. It may take all year, it may take 84 years as it did for Anna, but perseverance will pay off.

We all experience a day-by day staying power in our life efforts. For instance, marriage and raising children requires our daily attention and patience. As Erma Bombeck, whom is quoted often, wrote in one of her syndicated newspaper columns: "Children are a lot like kites... You spend a lifetime trying to get them off the ground... Finally they are airborne, but then need more string and you keep letting it out, and with each twist of the ball of twine, there is a sadness that goes with the joy because the kite becomes distant, and somehow you know that it won't be long before that beautiful creature will snap the

Living with hope

"I bring you good tidings of great joy for all people," the angel declared to the shepherds at Christ's birth. We read this hope-filled passage from the Gospel of Luke on Christmas Eve. Our Lord came down from the heavens to earth and became one of us in order to save us! Good news of great joy! As we begin a new year, possibly struggling financially, relationally, emotionally, physically or spiritually, do we remember these words? Why do some of us feel hopeless?

A woman that we read about in the Gospel of Luke (Luke 13:10-17) must have felt the same way. She suffered with an illness for 18 years – 18 years of pain, anguish and distress. She had a disease that fused the bones in her back together. Sufferers can only relieve the pain by leaning forward. The more they lean to relieve the pain, the greater the angle. Eventually, the patient is so bent over that she cannot look up. This woman could only see her feet and the ground. She was bent over, focused on herself and her own problems.

Our lives may be the same way. In daily struggles, our inner lives can become bent and crooked. We can fall into a stagnant state in our relationship with God. Day after day, we follow the same routine. Some of us go through the motions, drifting through life. Have you ever floated in a raft down a river? Rivers typically follow a crooked pattern. They weave and wind throughout the land because rivers follow the path of least resistance, flowing to the easiest, most accommodating place. The same holds true in our spiritual lives. As we choose not to follow Christ and take the path of least resistance, we end up living crooked, bent over lives.

The beginning of the year brings hope. We read in the Gospel of John: "I have come that they may have life and have it abundantly." Our Lord wants us to live joyfully and abundantly. We see a great example of the Lord's deep love and concern for us in the healing of the bent over woman. Jesus immediately responded to her. He was not indifferent to her hurt and despair. Apart from being compassionate, the Lord is also powerful. He can heal our hurts and free us from those things that bind us. Our Lord can heal and restore us!

Do life's challenges have you bent over? Is your life filled with hopelessness? As we begin a new year, will you continue to rely on your-

Parish Council meeting of November 18

Financial Report

✦ The comparative financial report dated October 31, 2009 & 2010 was reviewed by Steve Savas. Nick Kirkeles moved to approve both statements, subject to year-end review. The motion passed unanimously.

Stewardship

✦ Stephen Melonides reported that the church received 792 pledges, 4 more than the same period last year, totaling \$28,127.50 paid in October, (down ~\$5,327.50), for the same period last year, for an average pledge of \$832.02. Amount paid in October was \$584,416.95.

Correspondence

✦ Lillian Vandarakis sent a card thanking the parish for the floral arrangement in memory of her husband, Gus Vandarakis.

Meditation

✦ Fr. Bill asked Council members to focus on their personal prayers for a successful 2011 stewardship campaign. He mentioned A.W. Tozer's book, *The Pursuit of God*, which discusses how we can find the divine in the everyday. While man tries to find God, God is, simultaneously, in pursuit of man. Even though God allows pain and suffering in our lives, he also allows many joys. Fr. Bill turned the focus to the Thanksgiving Eve Vespers Liturgy and quoted St. Paul, who said, "In everything... give thanks". Fr. Bill said that we should share the Old or New Testament with our families prior to our Thanksgiving meal.

Building & Grounds

✦ Jim Fotopoulos indicated that the backup generator will supply electricity to our pumps in the event of a power failure. The

generator system should be in by next week.

✦ Other tasks completed: Four backup emergency lights were installed in the restrooms; a hanger system was installed behind the altar for the Altar Boys; and the sidewalk is accessible for the handicap parking.

Technical Committee

✦ President Peter Poteres presented the report for Paul Kallis. Steve Savas and Paul Kallis will contact the various parish groups for training on the new system.

✦ Paul asked that the weekly bulletin include a note about parishioners registering their e-mail addresses on the church website.

✦ Also, parishioners with website experience are invited to join the committee to help with the website upgrade.

Stewardship Sunday

✦ Sunday, November 21 was Stewardship Sunday. Stephen Melonides went over the changes made to the 2011 stewardship pamphlet.

Old Business

✦ Peter Tomaras reported that the disabled walkways are completed and he will arrange for a final inspection by the State of Illinois.

✦ In regards to a Youth Director, the committee is drafting a job description to be discussed at the December Parish Council meeting.

✦ The Parish Council remembered Don Bugajski in his falling asleep in our Lord, and how he would always help usher. May his memory be eternal.

New Business

✦ Pathways Foundation sent a letter asking about our plans for the funds they sent to further assist the disabled in our church. Discussion ensued and President Peter Poteres will address the request.

✦ Chrisy Banakis, on behalf of Cathy Magas and the Philoptochos, brought up a request to update the cry/bride's room.

General Assembly meeting report

Highlights of 2010 given by President Poteres at the November 21 parish assembly included: completion of the State of Illinois inspection, the 90% completion of the City of Westchester violations, and the recognition of Holy Apostles, one of two churches acknowledged, by Pathways Foundation with a \$1,000 check for our work in addressing the needs of disabled parishioners; a retreat for Parish Council members, the first in fourteen years, and AED and CPR training for them.

Financial Report

Treasurer Steve Savas reviewed the financial reports for October 31, 2009 & 2010. The month ended on October 31 was unfavorable (\$36,356.49).

Stewardship Report

Stephen Melonides reviewed the stewardship report for October 31, 2010. The church received 792 pledges, 4 more pledges for the same period last year, totaling \$28,127.50 paid in October, (down ~\$5,327.50 for the same period last year), for an average pledge of \$832.02.

Spiritual Growth

Father Bill reported that, to date, Holy Apostles had 30 baptisms, 12 weddings and 24 funerals. He also stated that the aim of man's life is union with God or theosis.

Youth Programs

Fr. Nicholas thanked all the parish volunteers. He pointed out that we have 36 altar boys and thanked Mike Cotsilis for his dedication to that program for so many years. He also thanked Presbyteria Michelle for her work on Superheroes, the Saints of the Church, Holy Apostles' 2010 Vacation Bible School program. Lou Kafkes and Steve Savas were acknowledged for the 5K Run, which raised \$6,500 for the Philoxenia House.

Building & Grounds

President Peter Poteres thanked Jim Fotopoulos, George Alex, Greg Vandarakis, and Steve Savas for all the work they do for the church.

We had 57 building violations and all but 12 have been addressed. Some of the violations were small but time-consuming to complete (i.e. emergency lighting in the restrooms, changing the height of fire extinguishers,

changing wall electrical outlets, etc.)

Ways & Means

There were 307 reservations for our annual Macaronatha Luncheon, which supports missions work. After Fr. Bill's promotion of the luncheon at the end of Liturgy, 12 additional parishioners decided to attend that afternoon. Additionally, the Golf Outing was comprised of 99 golfers and 55 sponsors and netted \$11k. The committee is encouraging more women and children to attend the next outing.

Outreach

The Welcome Ministry, developed by former Parish Council member, Marilyn Athas, has been re-established. There is a welcome table in the Narthex and another one in the multi-purpose room.

Education Committee

Sunday School enrollment, ranging from three year olds through high school, is 310. Compared to last year, our enrollment has declined by 11%.

Greek School

President Peter Poteres reported that 104 children are enrolled in Greek School. Tuition was raised 6%, the first increase in 3 years, but parents who paid in full the first week paid the 2009 tuition cost. A 35% increase in tuition receipts for September was noted.

Facilities Committee

The committee consisting of Sandy Fiascone, Chrisy Banakis, Joan Berg, and Don Phillips of Phillips Flowers address the church's floral needs. Christmas decorations will be put up on December 17 and will remain up through Epiphany. A color scheme for Pascha 2011 has yet to be discussed and determined.

Technical Committee

The Committee addressed three projects in 2010: the sound system, the e-mail server, and the new website.

Closing

Before President Peter Poteres opened the floor for the 2011-2012 Parish Council nominations, he thanked outgoing Parish Council members, Chrisy Banakis, Mara Georges, and Stephen Melonides, for their time and work.


The closing prayer was given by Father Nicholas Georgiou.

Adventure Theater stays in the shadows

Adventure Theater surprised its audience with a special treat December 5 during its production of *Welcome to Christmas Valley*. A graphic designer and Adventure Theater alumna herself, Stella Athanas helped the kids enhance their radio play with a life-size shadow box.

On a set that was 18 feet long and 13 feet high, the shadow box featured six scenes of black foam cut outs against a back-lit, high-definition screen. Although most of the silhouettes were still, Stella and Adventure Theater members Diana Kafkes and Gabriella Lozano used moving pieces to animate dramatic scenes like a plane flying through a snow storm and crashing near the valley or a train traveling through a 200 foot Christmas tree.

"The silhouettes were sharp and intricately detailed," said actor Marina Dimas. "They brought Adventure Theater's play to life."

The shadow box also created a winter storm as the kids, with the help of Adventure Theater pianist Gracie Govositis, threw confetti to make the snow.

"The advantage to doing radio plays is that you can create in people's imaginations, sets that it would take millions of dollars [for] Hollywood to create on a stage," said adult supervisor George Demetralis. "You can do it with radio, but you have to create that in people's imaginations. But with a shadow box [the kids] were able to show it."

Mr. D. first shared his December radio play with Stella one Sunday last summer when she visited to buy one of Mr. D.'s books for her son. When he mentioned they would draw pic-

tures for the play and display them with an overhead projector, she suggested the shadow box.

During a rehearsal in the fall, recalled Mr. D., Stella brought examples of how overhead projections and a shadow box would each look. The kids overwhelmingly picked the shadow box.

"They're a wonderful group," said Mr. D., who likes to give the kids as much decision-making power as possible. "You want them to be behind it whatever we do."

Stella collaborated with Diana and Gabriella from the beginning to decide which scenes to bring to life with the shadow box.

"We worked on the sketches pretty much together, and I just produced them at home," said Stella. "The girls had a lot of input. It was fun to work with them."

Alex Patt also assisted in developing pieces for the shadow box, said Stella, and created the hand-held train featured in the final scene.

For Stella, the biggest challenge of making the sets was their size. "They were enormous," she recalled of the 4' x 8' panels. "They were over my head as I drove the 11 miles to church. Getting there was pretty challenging; making them wasn't difficult."

But when they got there, the kids were ecstatic with the result. "Oh my gosh, you should have heard them. They were just, 'Oh look!'" said Mr. D. "I felt good about it because they were given the options and they voted for that. None of them said it wasn't what I thought. They were so impressed."

Dimas agrees. "The shadow box effects raised our production to a whole new level," he said. "We were fortunate to have an alumna of the group share her talents with us."

Adventure Theater members will start rehearsing again in January, so mark your calendars for their next play on April 10.

A spirit of resolve needed

lifeline that bound you together and soar as it was meant, ...free and alone. But then, there are also the cases where the kite suddenly nose dives toward the ground, and you have to be ready to patiently try to get it airborne again."

Everything worthwhile in life requires a resolve spirit to complete the task ahead. Endurance does not necessarily depend on bodily elements, such as muscles, nerves, or blood. Real strength can be a mental quality, an attribute of God, which we reflect.

The advent of 2011 presents a challenge to us to make realistic resolutions for the coming year, and to back them up with serious stick-to-itiveness in order to have a victory celebration at year's end. Remember God's promise to the rich man who sought to acquire the kingdom and was told to sell all his possessions and follow Him: "But when he heard this, he became very sorrowful, for he was very rich..." And those who heard it said, "Who then can be saved?" But He said, "The things which are impossible with men are possible with God." Set in place goals that are realistic and don't give up because if these goals are within God's plan, they will be achieved.

adultery and murder. Although he was a man after God's heart, David was trapped in the cycle of sin. After he fell, David picked himself up and came back to God.

As this New Year begins, some of us may feel crooked. We are bent over and short on hope. Maybe we need a new beginning because of some failure, perhaps as spouses, parents or employees, this past year. Maybe we feel distant from God. No matter what the failure is, there is still a new beginning for us. God is the Lord of new starts. David wrote the hopeful Psalm 51 that will help us in our new start with God. St. John Chrysostom said this passage is beneficial for sinful people. It reminds us of our Lord's great mercy and infinite tenderheartedness for us. The priest recites this every Divine Liturgy before the Great Entrance: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. Cast me not away from Your presence, and take not Your Holy Spirit from me. Restore to me the joy of Your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit. Then I will teach transgressors Your ways, and sinners shall return to You."

**Dimitri's Cross
The Life & Letters of St.
Dimitri Klepinin,
Martyred during the
Holocaust**

Fr. Dimitri Klepinin, Orthodox priest, Prisoner Number 38,890, died in the concentration camp at Dora in Germany in the middle of the night of Feb. 9, 1944. One year earlier to the day, after celebrating his last liturgy as a free man, he surrendered to the Gestapo and was arrested by the Nazis for issuing false baptismal certificates to the Jews.

Fr. Dimitri was glorified by the Orthodox Church on Jan. 16, 2004. In this volume, his daughter lovingly tells the story of her father's life from childhood in pre-revolutionary Russia to his martyrdom. It is a story of a man whose entire life was founded on love—for his God, his faith, his family and all those who came to him for help.

While the story of Fr. Dimitri's life may seem somber, this book is a testimony of love and sacrifice and introduces us to the life of a Russian Orthodox priest who lived for others and died a hero's death and carried his cross to the grave.
