

Motion sustained

I always enjoyed reading history, especially American history. Recently I thought it time in my life to begin

to examine some of the articles accumulated in the past 60 years. I came across an article describing the most astounding presidential victory of all time, the 1948 upset win of Truman over Dewey. It was the year pollster Elmo Roper on September 9 showed Dewey leading Truman by an enormous 52 to 37 percent, and announced that he would do no more polling in the campaign. The tide was irreversible. Dewey was in! The Gallup Poll and others made similar projections of a landslide victory for Thomas E. Dewey.

Life magazine, the leading popular magazine of the time, carried a full-page picture of Governor and Mrs. Dewey captioned, "The next president travels by ferryboat over the broad waters of San Francisco Bay." The Saturday Evening Post of Oct. 16 featured an article, "What Kind of a President will Dewey Make?'

The remarkable thing about it all was that Truman didn't believe any of it. On his crosscountry whistle-stop tours, the first question every reporter asked in joining the train was, "Doesn't he know?" Nobody seemed to want to tell Truman that he was licked. "The most impressive thing about President Truman," Life magazine wrote, "was his incredible ability to pretend that nothing was wrong. Finally there was the edition with photographs of Truman cackling over a copy of the Chicago Tribune with its embarrassing DEWEY DEFEATS TRUMAN headline. I have often wondered what sustained President Truman through that "hopeless" campaign. Looking back we realize that something sustained him, some kind of inner strength kept him going. Truman wasn't a particularly religious man so we can't identify that as the source.

Diana Nyad recently captured the attention of millions for her incredible swimming achievement. At age 64, she became the first person to swim from Cuba to Florida without the protection of a shark cage or using swim fins. Swimming on her fifth attempt to reach the coast, she succeeded, and one of her first comments was, "Never give up."

Other people in history were sustained by something within their character that is a mystery to others.

We do know, however, what sustained two biblical persons. The psalmist David and the apostle Paul, both of whom faced serious opposition in their lifetimes, gave credit to God. "The Lord sustains me," the psalmist exclaimed after stating that he had many foes, even "ten thousands of people who have set themselves against me round about" (Psalm 3:5-6."

So too Paul, after recounting to Timothy how he had "fought the good fight," and finished the race," he said he was sustained by God: "The Lord stood by me and gave me strength..." (2 Tim. 4:7:17). Bruised and hurt, Paul had known days when he wondered if he could take even one more step. Then listening to the "still, small voice," he pushed on, building a church hardly anyone seemed to want, preaching a gospel few wanted to hear, offering a way of life only a handful wished to

It is not difficult to understand why he wrote that "we look not to the things that are seen but to the things that are unseen." So far as anyone could see there was nothing in the visible scene to keep Paul and his contemporaries on their feet. There was something more to sustain them, however, than the obvious. There was the love of God evident in their lives. There was a gentle calling, "Come unto Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. I will sustain you." Although we do not know the inner strength of Harry Truman and Diana Nyad, we do know unequivocally that God's love and grace flowed through the veins of the psalmist and the apostle Paul.

We all struggle and have personal challenges in life from time to time. Let us emulate the strong faith of our two biblical persons that will sustain us to do all things that are pleasing to Him. In pursuit of our daily goals, go forward believing...God sustains us.

Fans or followers of Christ?

Fall is here, which can only mean one thing.

NFL football season is upon us! Two students in Emory University's Sports Marketing Analytics program conducted an interesting study to find the most "loyal and supportive" NFL fans. Instead of simply finding the team with the most tickets sold, the students factored in the team win/loss record, area population and median income to determine which teams' fans come to the games most. A fan equity ranking indicated which fans are the most committed to their teams. The results were fairly predictable at the top, but the bottom was surprising. The Dallas Cowboys have the most loyal fans followed by the New England Patriots. The Chicago Bears ranked seventh. Oakland Raiders' fans finished last!

A fan is defined as an enthusiastic admirer. The Bears have many fans. In the same way, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ has many fans when things are going well.

What if challenging times come? We Christians tend to blame God. If we find ourselves in difficult seasons of our lives, we fans sometimes walk away from Christ. The Gospel of Matthew issues a strong warning. Jesus said: "Not everyone who says to Me Lord, Lord, shall enter the Kingdom of Heaven but he who does the will of My Father in heaven." (Matthew 7:21) Fans cannot be passive observers but active participants.

We are challenged to confess with our mouth and even more with our lives. Later in the passage, Christ warns again: "I will declare to them, I never knew you; depart from Me." (Matthew 7:23) Christian fans often grade themselves on a curve. They look at the lives of others and tell themselves: "I am not that bad." If they feel they are more Christian than the other person, everything is fine. Our relationship with Christ, however, is graded with Him alone. He does not grade on a curve. Does He know us? Are we mere fans or true followers of Christ?

The Holy Scriptures have many examples of fans and followers of Christ. The Pharisees knew much about God. They believed in Him, but they did not really know Him intimately. The Pharisees did not have a personal relationship with God. Jesus described the Pharisees: "These people draw near to Me with their mouth, And honor Me with their lips, but their heart is far from Me." (Matthew 15:8) They were fans. Does this describe us?

+ The comparative financial report dated May 31 was reviewed by George Mannos. Jim Fotopoulos moved to approve the financial statements dated May 31 subject to year-end review The motion passed unanimously.

Stewardship

+ Louis Katzioris reviewed the Stewardship Report for May 31. Pledges to date for 2013 are 669 which are 8 better than this period last year. Total amount pledged to date for 2013 is \$616,769.25 which is \$6,240.71 less than the same period last year. Percent paid to date is 74% vs. 73% for the same period last year.

ridiculed by his neighbors. Daniel followed God by praying and being thrown into a lion's den.

Are you ready for a test? The Gospel of Luke details a story about a fan and follower of Christ. Simon, a Pharisee, invited Jesus to his home to dine with him. Simon knew all about Christ, but did not really know Him. This religious leader with all the head knowledge is a fan. A sinful woman came to the home and "stood at Christ's feet behind Him weeping; and she began to wash His feet with her tears, and wiped them with the hair of her head; and she kissed His feet and anointed them with the fragrant oil." (Luke 7:38) Jesus reprimands Simon and tells him that when He entered his home, Simon did not offer Him water to wash the dust from His feet. The sinful woman washed them with tears and her hair. Simon did not greet Christ with a kiss. The sinful woman continually kissed Christ's feet. She is a true follower. Who are you most like in this story?

Many believe, but how many actually follow? In the four Holy Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, Jesus says "believe in Me" about five times. "Follow Me" is utilized about 20 times! As football season begins, our challenge is to become not just fans but true followers of Christ!

Veterans' Day


