

Christ the messenger

The Russian writer Tolstoy told the story of

Martin, the old shoemaker, who longed to die. A pilgrim told him that it was because he lived entirely for his own pleasure.

"For what should I live?" asked Martin.
"For God alone," was the reply. "How?" asked
Martin. "Read the Old Testament," replied
the pilgrim.

So Martin read, and as he read he grew happier and happier. He began to live for God alone. One night he heard a voice in his sleep calling him: "Martin, look into the street tomorrow. I am coming to visit you." Martin rose early and watched the window. Presently an old soldier, bent and cold, knocked at his door. Martin invited him in and gave him some hot soup. Then a woman with her baby, shivering with cold knocked. He took them in and fed and clothed them. There was a third knock and at the door stood an old apple woman. Martin gave her shelter. Martin waited on, but no one else came.

That night as he was falling asleep, a voice whispered in his ear: "Martin, dost thou not know me?" "Who art thou?" asked Martin. "Even I."

The old soldier appeared, whispered, "Lo, it is I!" and vanished. "It is I!" whispered a second voice, and the woman with her baby appeared and vanished.

"It is I" whispered a third voice and the old apple woman appeared and was gone. Then Martin realized that Jesus had visited him that day and he had received him. He got the message.

We believe God does send messengers to us as did the Bible writers. The Book of Malachi, which closes out the OT, states "Behold, send my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly

come to his temple; the messenger of the covenant in whom you delight, behold, he is coming says the Lord of hosts" (Malachi 3:1).

The messenger of this passage has been variously identified by scholars as Elijah the prophet or some other messianic figure of the OT. The Christian interpretation is John the Baptist or Jesus himself. Regardless of whom the author of Malachi had in mind, the point is that God sends messengers with His message of grace and judgment.

I have always looked upon Harry S. Truman as an important figure in American history. The role he played in making the decision to use the atomic bomb, which saved thousands of American lives, will be judged by future historians as a significant act to bring a close to World War II. In one of his biographies, Harry Truman was asked the meaning of the Post Office motto: "Neither snow, nor rain, nor heat, nor gloom of night stays these couriers from the swift completion of their appointed round." Truman, who had a knack for distilling a message to its essence, replied: "It means they deliver the mail in the winter-time."

In making a statement similar in form to the Post Office motto, St. Paul wrote that "...neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38).

Messages of every kind come to us in different places through a variety of persons. In life, we should not be impervious to our surroundings and to those with whom we associate daily. We take for granted at times some of the most moving and meaningful messages. I share with you some of the most beautiful and important messages we enjoy hearing:

I love you. It's benign, not malignant. It's a boy! It's a girl! No cavities. All is forgiven. God bless you. Welcome home. Your car is ready. You passed the examination. Your child is beautiful. You were right. I am ready to sign.

Waiting for the perfect gift

Christmas is almost

here! Some of us are preparing Christmas wish lists and waiting for the perfect gift. A few years ago, our son, James, wanted just one gift. After opening many presents, one remained. The small box did not look like the gift he desired. He opened the box that contained many clues. Following the clues and a treasure map eventually led him downstairs to his brand new Playstation 3 video game! When he finally found the treasured gift, he was ecstatic and jumped for joy!

What are you waiting for this Christmas? Are you longing for a special gift? What are you expecting to receive? In St. Luke's Gospel, we find one person who was waiting for something. He was actually waiting for someone. You will never see him in Nativity scenes or Christmas cards. He was waiting, greatly expecting the coming of the Messiah, our Savior. St. Simeon's feast day is celebrated on February 2.

Simeon was waiting for the coming of Christ. Israel lost its political independence and its people had not heard from God for many years. They were ruled by the Romans and feared the crafty, cruel King Herod. People wondered if the Messiah would ever come. Simeon clung to a promise that "he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ." (Luke 2:26) He focused on the comfort Christ would bring. As we may sometimes struggle with loneliness, emptiness and insecurity, seeking comfort is a universal need.

Simeon was moved by the Holy Spirit to enter the Temple the same day Mary and Joseph brought Christ to the Temple. He saw the baby Jesus and realized God had kept His promise. Simeon realized that God fulfilled His individual promise to him and the prophet's promise by sending the Anointed One. He beheld Emmanuel, which means "God with us". God is a personal God who became incarnate to eliminate rejection, fear and loneliness. He came to walk with us in our daily struggles.

What are you waiting for this Christmas? Are you waiting for the Bestower of perfect gifts? You may be asking what gifts does our gracious Lord give us? The Lord offers us all help in our present situation. Think back to that first Christmas Eve and the shepherds sitting outside on a cold night watching the sheep. They were hoping no wolves would come and attack as they waited for the light of

day. Shepherds were poor people and did not have much hope of improving their lives. Then, one glorious night, the angels appeared and exclaimed: "Unto you is born this day, in the city of David, a Savior who is Christ the Lord." Suddenly, everything changed! God became real to them. He came to help them and bring "peace on earth" and "good will to men." The Wise Men, the Magi, were also there. Although they were wealthy and powerful people, the Magi experienced emptiness in their lives. They followed the star because they desired something to fill their emptiness. Whether we are rich or poor, powerful or weak, we need God's help. Our Lord promised and commanded us to "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28) When we allow the Lord to enter our minds, hearts and souls, we will receive the grace that only He can give. The Scriptures remind us that the "peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds, through Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:7)

The good news is that if you are hurting today, there is help now and hope for the future. Hope kept the shepherds going. God made a promise to His people. He would one

Christmas is about presents. Not earthly presents but God's presence to comfort us in difficult times and bring hope for the future. The perfect gift is given on the Feast of the Nativity. St. Paul tells us: "When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth His Son, to redeem those who were under the law that we might receive adoption as sons." (Galatians 4:4) For us, the perfect gift is becoming a son and heir of God. God took on human flesh to reunite us with our Heavenly Father — offering us eternal peace of soul and spirit.
